

What is Blended Learning?

It's a formal instructional program that combines active, engaged online learning with active, engaged learning in the classroom.

Blended learning gives students more control over the time, place, and pace of their learning, and it gives teachers more ways to increase student engagement.

The Station Rotation Model



Flipped Classroom

The Flipped Classroom moves students back and forth between teacher-guided instruction and online instruction. To implement a Flipped Classroom model, teachers must shift portions of their lessons online, so students can move at their own pace and work at home to go into more depth if needed.



Whole Group Rotation

In the Whole Group model, the entire class moves between online and offline activities.
