How can you support Access & Achievement?

Institutions can help support students by creating a space to focus on their academic goals, providing high-quality course materials from the first day of class. Instruction can be customized to meet the needs of diverse students and varying skill levels through adaptive software that creates personalized paths to success.



Basic Needs

While many organizations have instituted programs to help access through affordability and lowering some academic barriers to entry, many have not addressed access to the necessities of life such as healthy food.

In Fall 2021, over 58% of Canadian post-secondary students reported some level of food insecurity. If left unchecked, a lack of access to necessities will continue to get in the way of academic achievement, which can lead to dissatisfaction with the overall higher education experience.



Day One Access

Equitable Education will never be achieved if access to course materials remains a privilege. Further efforts should be undertaken to increase access to course materials to facilitate and support learning.

Institutions should take steps to provide access to needed course materials prior to the first day of class and throughout the learners' higher education experiences.



Adaptive Learning

Instruction should meet and engage students where they are. Adaptive software can create tailored and dynamic paths for student success.

Every student has their own unique learning ability, pace, and circumstance, so instruction should be customized using adaptive technologies that zero in on what students know or do not know.


